CULTIVATING WIDER PERSPECTIVES

I would like to share a story which was shared by Mr. Soichi Noguchi. Mr. Soichi Noguchi, a famous astronaut who stayed at the ISS (International Space Station) for a long period of time, explained why humans want to go into space. To explain that he used one metaphor.

Imagine that there is nothing but a straight line in the world and the group of ants is walking from this side to the other side. They can only go forward or go back on the line. They are called "Single dimensional ants" or "1D ants". Suddenly a large stone

blocked the line, and the group of the 1D ants was stuck, they were unable to move forward. They became very upset. For them, this is like the end of the world. Then some of the ants in that group thought maybe they could go around the stone from left or right. They stepped out of the line and moved left or right. They discovered a new direction to move forward. They are called "Two-dimensional ants" or "2D ants". They stepped out of this straight line (1D world), went left or right, walked around the stone, and found another path on the other side of the stone. 2D ants overcame the challenge by seeing the world from a two-dimensional point of view.

Now they proceeded, and then after a while, they now encountered a huge wall. The wall is so wide, and it seems like there is no way that the ants can walk around the wall like last time. Again, they were stuck and upset. Then some of them began to climb that wall. The 2D ants said, "Hey, that's too dangerous. Don't do it." But those courageous ants (now we call them "three-dimensional ants" or "3D ants") thought maybe we can move not only forward, backward, right, or left, but also, we can move up and down. The 3D ants challenged the wall, they succeeded, and they were able to see beautiful scenery on the other side of the wall. Through this metaphor, the astronaut Mr. Soichi Noguchi talked about the importance of seeing things from different perspectives. Compared to the 1D ants or 2D ants, the 3D ants had a broader perspective to see their surroundings. And thanks to that perspective, they could overcome their challenges and they were able to enjoy the other side of the wall. Mr. Soichi Noguchi said that the reason why humans venture into space is not simply to go to a distant planet, but by doing so, we may be able to discover another perspective to see the Earth. We may be able to find another solution to solve the problems that we are facing on the Earth such as climate change or conflicts between countries.

This story teaches us the importance of cultivating a wider perspective. You may laugh about their limitations, but I think we are like 1D ants or 2D ants. Usually, we don't think that our perspectives are limited. We think that our perspective is always right. We divide things such as good or bad, high or low, rich or poor, health and sick, young and old, right or wrong, my life or your life, friend or enemy, etc. We judge people or divide things based on a limited perspective.

Buddhism teaches us that such a self-centered and judgmental perspective is the cause of suffering which we experience in our lives. Like these ants, we encounter many challenges or obstacles in life. Sometimes we

feel this is the dead-end. But if we can cultivate a new perspective, maybe we can overcome those challenges. Maybe we can discover a new, brighter, and beautiful new world which we had never experienced before.

Unfortunately, most of us are not able to go into space, but fortunately, we have Buddhism. For me, Buddhism is like going into space and seeing myself from a different perspective. Then we will discover something new about our own lives. Buddha's perspective (Buddha's teaching) helps us to find solutions to the challenges or obstacles that we are facing.

For example, Buddhism talks about impermanence. Impermanence means things will change, and nothing stays the same. It teaches me to enjoy every moment, to appreciate every encounter, and to fully live this unrepeatable life.

Buddhism also talks about interdependence. Interdependence means that each and every one of us is the irreplaceable and indispensable part of the universe. No life is wasted. It teaches me that I need to think, speak, and act with compassion and understanding because what I do affects others.

Also in Jodo Shinshu, we recite Namo Amida Butsu. Namo Amida Butsu is the compassionate voice from the universe embracing and affirming us just as we are. It warmly pushes my back saying, "You are fine just as you are." "You are beautiful just as you are."

Buddha's Wisdom and Compassion provides us with new perspectives. As we learn more about Buddhism, these teachings naturally become part of our lives. We can find clarity and meaning in our lives. And this new discovery opens a new world right in front of us. And a new "me" will step forward.

Open Letter to the Moiliili Hongwanji Sangha

Dear Members & Friends,

There have been questions regarding the happenings with Moililli Hongwanji over the past year. We were informed that the family that owns the adjacent property that is enclosed by the temple, annex, and side parking lot was interested in finally selling. Our temple forefathers including Mr. Kinji Kanazawa had been trying to purchase the property for over 50 years.



Around the same time, it was brought to our attention that the structure housing the Project Dana office on Nakookoo Street had been falling into a state of disrepair to the point that it may not be usable as an office space. This serendipitous opportunity came forth with the idea to exchange the property with the family that adjoins the temple. However, they decided they wanted to sell their University property instead. Because of this, the Board of Directors approved the sale of the Nakookoo property, in part to help finance the purchase of the University property once the title could be cleared. The University property is currently in the quiet title process as the ownership is being consolidated and put under a trust by the family. Sidney Kanazawa, Kinji's son and attorney, has been in contact with the family's attorney and we are looking to purchase it for a fair price once it is ready for sale. As far as what to do with the property, that is still up in the air, but we cannot lose this rare opportunity to acquire the adjacent property.

In addition, it is with heavy heart that I report the Board of Directors of Moiliili Hongwanji has decided to close the Moiliili Hongwanji Preschool at the end of the school year in May of 2022.

The Board recognized that it was in the best interest for the overall welfare and future of the temple that the Preschool be closed at this time. Our Preschool has been an integral part of the community for nearly 60 years and has touched the lives of many families. This is especially difficult for me because both Jayden and Kayla attended the preschool, and we have fond memories of them going there.

I am extremely hopeful that we can remake the vacated space into a social hall or gathering place for all our temple members and the community to enjoy. This will rejuvenate our facilities and refocus our temple towards its post-pandemic life.

The pandemic has been hard on everyone. I want to share my appreciation and thanks to both our Preschool Director and Chairperson for their endless and steadfast efforts that kept our Preschool open for the children, their families, and our staff throughout much of the pandemic.

I would also like to thank the Board for the tough decisions that they had to make and to the membership who continue to support the temple through the challenging times we are experiencing because of COVID. It is through all of us working together, that we can ensure a brighter future moving forward. In gassho,

Tips on Things to do Before going to the Doctor

Here are some practical suggestions on what to do before going to your doctor's appointment.

Thank you to SHIP Hawaii (State Health Insurance Assistance Program) for these excellent tips on being a proactive patient.

Write in a notepad or paper the following important information:

Date of visit

Doctor's name and address

Doctor's phone number

Reason for visit

Symptoms/ medical problem you are having How long you have had this problem or symptoms Questions you want to ask the doctor about this problem or symptoms

Make a list of all the prescription and non prescription (over the counter/OTC) medicines, to include vitamins, minerals, dietary, and herbal supplements you're now taking

Show this list to your doctor during your visit

Other important things to have prepared before the appointment:

Arrange for transportation to and from appointment

Ask a friend or family member to come with you (if needed)

Bring your insurance cards, photo id, payment (if needed)

Contact information for emergencies
A list of questions (see above) for the doctor

Most important, do not be afraid to ask if you don't understand what your doctor is saying to you.

However months had passed and the children did not contact us because they didn't know what to do even when their parent was critically ill. Help prepare your family by having all the important papers together in one place for them. Include the "Funeral Services Handbook" from Moiliili Hongwanji.

Here are three excerpts from this handbook:

Bedside Appreciation Service – In Buddhism such rituals have served the purpose of offering comfort to the dying person and to the family who are dealing with the emotions of grief and loss... In being able to hear the words of Dharma that are shared through the chanting of the sutra and the words of the minister, and to feel the presence of beloved family members surrounding the bed, the person is able to feel strength, comfort and relief from fear and anxiety.

<u>Columbarium</u> - All current dues paying members of MHM qualify for columbarium niche use.

Hakkotsu No Sho (On the White Ashes) - In silently contemplating the transient nature of human existence, nothing is more fragile and fleeting in this world than the life of man. ... By so understanding the meaning of death, we shall come to fully appreciate the meaning of this life which is unrepeatable and thus to be treasured above all else....

You may not be able to do it yourself but possibly a member of your family who is more technologically astute may be asked to help. Thank you.
