If you would like to purchase more tickets, simply call the office at (808)949-1659. If not, tickets must be returned to the temple office. Mahalo!



Thoughts on Halloween and Eitaikyo in November

The month of October and Halloween is the beginning of a much awaited for year-end celebrations and fun-filled days and nights of activities for both children and grown-ups alike. We look in anticipation for food and drink as we anxiously await the coming Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year celebrations, not to mention the many Bowl

games on TV, pupus, and liquid refreshments. We look upon Halloween as a time for ghosts and goblins, spirits and monsters awaiting our call of "Trick or Treat!"

Why do you think we are so afraid of ghosts and things that go creeping in the night? How come human beings have come to believe in werewolves that suck your blood in the night, zombies and vampires?

Maybe it's because there are so many dangers in the world. There is a lot to fear. For thousands of years, we have lived in nature and were helpless against this unpredictable power. They were worried about being eaten by dangerous animals in the wild. At night, people huddled together for safety. People didn't understand occurrences such as tsunami, earthquakes, volcanic eruptions and hurricanes. We also developed a fear of other humans trying to do harm to us. So, we humans have developed a lot of fears about the world around us, and those ghosts and goblins may be a way for us to express those fears, and we have come to enjoy them as well.

If we are afraid of something, we must understand that they too are Buddhas someday and are ultimately a part of this Oneness of Life. The Oneness of life is that there is nothing that is not connected with me or is not a part of me.

EITAIKYO AND THANKSGIVING

Eitaikyo, a Buddhist observance in which we honor and express our gratitude for all those pioneers that have built and sustained our temples for generations, is observed during the month of November.

Eitaikyo is about appreciation. We realize that everything we receive in life – actually, life itself – is truly a gift. The main thing that makes it possible for anyone to live a full and creative life is the realization that "I exist only because of the limitless and unearned benevolence I am receiving at this moment, and in each and every moment.

This is the teaching of interdependence. When we truly realize interdependence, we cannot help but want to express gratitude to all beings. To understand the debt of gratitude we owe others mean that we have begun to desire happiness of all beings. This is the true Buddhist path, the path of the Onembutsu.

We express gratitude for the benevolent pioneers in providing us a wonderful place to hear the Dharma and that their kindness was directed to not only to the temple, but for the sake of all suffering beings. As we reflect on this, let us also remind ourselves to continually entrust in the Compassionate Vow of Amida Buddha and live the Teachings every moment of our lives.

Thanksgiving is a good time to reflect on our interdependence with all beings in the world and realize that our existence depends on others and that we cannot live or achieve anything without the help of others.

Update on HHMH Maui Wildfires Relief Fund

Mahalo to all who donated to the Maui relief efforts of Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii. Please refer to the HHMH website (Google Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii) for updates on relief efforts by the Social Concerns Committee.

Roughly half of all Lahaina Hongwanji families lost their homes to the devastating wildfires. One member has been confirmed to have lost his life after being on the list of the missing for some time. But one welcome action taken by the Social Concerns Committee was to send *cash assistance directly to impacted Lahaina Hongwanji members who lost their homes*. These families were forced to find temporary housing with family, friends, or even in temporary shelters provided through FEMA or the Red Cross, but cash assistance was also needed for food, clothing, and other necessities. Although all of their personal belongings are sadly lost forever, affected families are no doubt grateful for the assistance through HHMH.

On September 24, a special *Maui Wildfires Memorial Service* was held at Hawaii Betsuin. *Rev. Ai Hironaka*, resident minister of Lahaina Hongwanji, spoke with much emotion about the impact the fires had on himself and his family as well as his temple members. It was a touching dharma message, spoken from the heart, that showed how he and many others continue to struggle emotionally. The service was recorded and is available on YouTube or on the HHMH website.

Rev. Hironaka was recently assigned to Kahului Hongwanji, which had been without a resident minister since Rev. Tennes retired and returned to the mainland. Rev. Hironaka will also continue to minister to members of Lahaina Hongwanji, who are scattered throughout Maui and elsewhere.

Open House and Bazaar

Once again, Moiliili Hongwanji members showed they are able to put on a spectacular Open House and Bazaar! So many volunteers spent hours (some even days and weeks) preparing for the rummage sale, making food for sale, and baking cookies, dessert bars, and other goodies for the bake sale. *Many thanks to everyone* (including the Hawaii Kai Jaycees) who helped make this another successful event.

"Open House" was a special part of the event, with Rev. Bert leading two scheduled tours of the temple. Rev. Bert, assisted by Raymond Takiue and Mel Takemoto, welcomed visitors into the hondo to hear about the altar, Buddhist traditions, and an introduction to Buddhism. Several others also stopped by the MHM table in the annex to ask questions about the temple and Project Dana. We hope some of these visitors will come back again!

Kamehameha Schools plans for Moiliili

Kamehameha Schools has been an active partner with the Moiliili Summer Fest for more than a decade. Richard Chang, Calvin Mann, and Mae Nishimura of Kamehameha came to the temple after Sunday service on October 15 to share their plans for "redevelopment" of Kamehameha properties in Moiliili, in particular the old Varsity Theater site and the block between Coyne and Beretania Streets. Their plans are more of a "refresh" than a major development and plan to keep the Varsity parking lot open for what they consider Moiliili's signature event—the Moiliili Summer Fest and Bon Dance!

The redevelopment will displace some businesses for a while, but the end result will be a more attractive and inviting space in which to sit, eat, socialize, enjoy artwork and a Hawaiian sense of place. *Watch for the redevelopment to begin in a year or so.*

Fall Seminar on November 11

Mental health is important for everyone, especially in these difficult times that often challenge our ability to cope. But due to biases that place a stigma on mental illness, many people with depression, anxiety, and other mental health disorders ignore the symptoms and do not seek help and treatment. We can change this bias and stigma by understanding mental health.

Our Fall Seminar speaker is *Bud Bowles, Executive Director of United Self Help*, to discuss the "Most Ignored Organ in the Body." The seminar will be held *on Saturday, November 11, from 9:00 to 11:00 a.m.* Bud Bowles is a social worker by training and has decades of experience counseling and organizing to promote the well-being of hundreds of individuals in our community. Bud's organization, United Self Help, meets at Moiliili Hongwanji the last Friday of the month and weekly with self-help groups.

"Together We Share...Our Struggles, Our Joys" was Honolulu United BWA's Conference theme this year and was held on Saturday, August 26th at Betsuin's Annex Temple and Social Hall. We came together filled with "joy" that we could meet in-person after some 3 years of doing Zoom conferences. The day started with our Remembrance Service which this year honored the memory of 9 of our members who offered their hands and hearts in service to our temples. Two of our precious MHM ladies, Harumi Suzuki and Shuku Najita lived to 102 years old!

Moiliili was represented by 26 ladies and Rev. Bert in this conference which drew a total of 79 attendees.

In the Education portion of our conference, Rev. Shindo Nishiyama shared his own personal struggles with stress, panic attacks and thoughts of suicide. It was eye-opening that we can be almost oblivious to what is happening within our Sanghas and that making a sincere effort to "connect" with others can make a big difference in building healthy sanghas. Rev. Nishiyama shared that if his openness about his struggles can help even one person, then he was grateful to be able to talk about what he went through and continues to work on.

We held our General Membership meeting and saw our Dana Awardees for 2023: Project Dana, Adult Friend for Youth, We Are Oceania, Hawaii Project, Inc. (help keiki from homeless shelters), and the Honolulu Police Community Foundation. Each year, \$1,000 awards are given to support community groups and their efforts. This year, additionally, one-time \$1,000 awards were given to: Genki Ala Wai Project, Kids Hurt Too, Ma'l Movement and Healthy Mothers Healthy Babies. A special Humanitarian Dana Award of \$3,000 was given to HHMH for Lahaina Hongwanji. Our Dana Fund is able to offer this monetary support because of the generous donations from the BWAs of our temples (Hawaii Betsuin, Jikoen and Moiliili). We are sincerely thankful for the generosity of all our members!

We ended the conference day with Origami Fun! Thank you to: Donna Higashi, Anne Kawabata, Cynthia Ogasawara, Susan Okano, Ann Nakata, and Lois Ohta for leading the activity with small groups, making a simple lotus flower and flapping tsuru.

Daruma-san, our Capital Campaign drive "perseverance" icon, resides in room #2 of the Social Hall. Throughout the preparation and event of the Bazaar's Rummage sale in the halls, it remained steadfast although in another spot. It was moved from its normal position in hall #2 off its table, to an out of the way inconspicuous spot, perched on the piano in the dim, far northwest corner of hall #3. This was to allow Rummage to use the table he sits on during normal times. Despite its diminished presence, Daruma-san continued to watch over us from the obliviousness of its presence. It is said since the Edo period (1602 – 1868) in Japan, the doll has risen to popularity as a good fortune icon, modeled after the Bodhidharma founder of Zen

Buddhism. Its popular red color is believed to ward off evil and even protect people from the small pox epidemic. It has, from then, eventually evolved into the belief that the daruma doll could make one's dreams come true. It has in a sense, watched over us and given us the "ganbatte" or perseverance to come together in harmony to achieve the successful Bazaar of this year. *Thank you very much, Daruma-san.*

As of October 17th, Campaign Chair Nancy Shimamoto reported the current pledged funds are \$231,817, an increase of \$4,140 since the reporting in the previous newsletter. *Ganbatte!*















