

I Hear Music!

"Everybody who hears that music naturally conceives the thought to invoke the Buddha, to invoke the Dharma, and to invoke the Sangha."



Over the years, my wife and I have gone to see many concerts. As of this writing, I am currently streaming Taylor Swift's new album, and last night we went to see Debbie Gibson. Just after the double celebration in Kyoto, we went to Arizona to see Morgan Wallen.

When you hear your favorite song, what kind of emotions do you go through? Depending on the song, we may feel happiness, or sadness. We recall what we were doing when we first heard that song. Music even has the power to heal. And let's not forget the heavenly sound of fingernails scratching the chalkboard. (It sent shivers down your back, as you read that last part, didn't it?)

It is said that there isn't an exact definition to the word "music." Yet, we understand what is does, as it is a collection of sounds in a uniformed composition. Every instrument, every note works as one to make a beautiful sound. Perhaps that is why it is written in the Smaller Sutra that the Pure Land is filled with "heavenly" music, with a hundred thousand musical instruments playing at the same time.

Try and ponder this for a moment, when we sing the gathas, or perhaps our favorite songs, there is that sense of invoking something. Whether it's inspiration, visualization of something (such as the Pure Land), or praising something, someone, or event.

Music has the power to connect and unite everyone, no matter who we are. When we were at the Morgan Wallen concert, a conversation started before the concert began, to see where everyone was from. There were people of course from Arizona, but also people from Canada, New York, and everyone was surprised that my family and I were from Hawaii!

To me, that is a great example of "invoke the Sangha." All of us came together as one big community, connected by one single thing to sing, laugh and have a good time. That to me IS the Pure Land. All of us forgetting our problems, even if it's for a few hours, to truly live life.

The Buddha, Dharma and the Sangha has the power to unite us all. Namo Amida Butsu is the calling voice of Amida, calling out to us and we have that opportunity through the Primal Vow to be united as one big voice invoking the appreciation and gratitude of The Buddha, Dharma, and the Sangha, as it has it's place in our hearts and minds, and makes us who we are.

So let us continue to be centered around Namo Amida Butsu, and continue to invoke its power to embrace not only ourselves, but all beings with the aspiration of peace throughout the world.

Triple Celebration

To commemorate three significant events for Jodo Shinshu followers -namely, the 850th anniversary of Shinrran's birth, the 800th anniversary of the founding of Jodo Shinshu, and the 135th anniversary of the establishment of Honpa Hongwanji in Hawaii -a *Triple Celebration* is planned for *September 7 and 8* at *Ala Moana Hotel*. Registration is \$250 until April 30 and \$300 thereafter until July 31. The Moiliili Hongwanji Board voted to provide a subsidy of \$125 for each sustaining member registered by April 30. The keynote speaker will be Rev. Dr. Takashi Miyaji of South Alameda County Buddhist Church.

Honpa Hongwanji is also sponsoring an online Buddhist Education series that began in January. There is *no charge* to register for the dharma talks, but donations are welcome. The remaining talks are on:

May 18, 10:00 a.m., with Rev. Yuki Sugahara on "Kyogyoshinsho: Practice." June 22, 10:00 a.m., with Rev. Kiyonobu Kuwahara on "Kyogyoshinsho: Entrusting Heart." July 20, 10:00 a.m., with Rev. Henry Adams on "Kyogyoshinsho: Realization." August 24, 2:00 p.m., with Rev. Gene Sekiya on "The World is Waiting for Buddhism and Shinran

Shonin: Joy of the Nembutsu."

Temple Renovations

The Renovations Committee, co-chaired by **Melvin Takemoto** and **Osamu Kawabata**, has been hard at work with John Toguchi, architect, and Ralph S. Inouye Company, design-assist contractor, to finalize design and drawings for a building permit. Our volunteer architect, Glenn Miura, worked pro bono for two years to help us secure land use approvals and develop preliminary designs. We are so grateful to Glenn, who continues to be involved with the Renovations Committee! Unfortunately, because of issues at the City Department of Planning and Permitting, we don't expect construction to begin for another year.

In the meantime, temple space is being rented to various tenants, including Moiliili Sewing School, Na Leo Lani Choral Group, United Self Help, a hula halau, and a karate class. Space is also available to temple members at very reasonable rates (for the time being) for graduation parties, birthday parties, meetings, and other gatherings. **Contact the temple office if you need a place for your next gathering**.

The proposed renovations include upgrading the social hall and restrooms, leveling off the existing grass courtyard with permeable pavers, and installing a shade sail overhead. A unisex ADA-accessible restroom is also being considered, depending on available funds.

A **Capital Campaign** to fund the renovations is in the second year of a three-year campaign. Please consider a donation, but even more importantly, let us know who else we might be able to reach out to for a contribution - people who have been involved with Moiliili Hongwanji in the past (Dharma School, Preschool parents and students, Jr. YBA, Sr. YBA, and the like) and others you think may consider a donation. **Please contact the temple office with names and addresses - and your contribution!**

Preserving Oral Histories

A few Sundays ago, I had a brief conversation with Rev. Thomas Okano about his internment and deportation experience as a small child during World War II - all because his father, Rev. Ryoshin Okano, was a Hong-wanji minister. A truly fascinating story about how wartime hysteria perpetrated such tragic upheaval in so many families.

Oral history is a gathering of the life stories of individuals. Some may be significant people in our communities. But many are ordinary people living ordinary lives, who can tell us about how people lived. And occasionally, these ordinary people have extraordinary experiences to share. Oral histories can be recorded on voice recorders or with video camcorders and can later be transcribed so others may listen, see, and read the stories.

Our members at Moiliili Hongwanji have many stories to share but just may not realize it. Or they may have stories to share only with their families so generations to come will know who they were. The process to do an oral history is not complicated - i.e., work up an outline of what needs to be covered, use your smartphone to do an audio or video recording, then just start talking. This might be a good gift for your children and grand-children - your life story!

CAMPAIGNING FOR OUR TEMPLE'S RENOVATION–UPDATE 11

"The Capital Campaign is climbing new heights!"



On February 19, 2023, the members of the temple gathered together, for the first time after decades, in the Social Hall to celebrate its annual Shinnenkai 2023, and the launch of a three year renovations Capital Campaign drive. Members and the Board of Directors of Moiliili soft launched the Capital Campaign fund drive beginning in July 2022. They launched the campaign with a balance on February 21, 2023 of \$174,755. This year at the temple's annual Shinnenkai on February the Capital Campaign has reached its 25. climacteric point just beyond its half way point with a gratifying balance of \$250,897. As of April 15, the Capital Campaign fund balance is \$257,137. What an accomplishment! Working together we reached a milestone, reached a new peak, reached an unprecedented level. Let's continue to walk together on this path by inviting our families, friends, and community partners to help us reach our *tangible* goal. Let's do our best together! Ganbarimashou!

Renovating News:

The Renovations committee reported, (1) that the unanticipated topological survey requirement by the Department of Permitting and Planning (DPP) has been completed by ControlPoint Survey company, and is preparing the topographical report; (2) that the selection of a design assist contractor to collaborate with the architect during the design phase has selected Ralph S. Inouye; (3) that Alakai Mechanical has been selected to work on the backflow preventer; (4) a meeting on April 9 with Glenn Furukawa of Senior Care touched base with Glenn to let him know the status on the renovation plans of the temple and to also find out about the status of Glenn's adult day care operation. Glenn still plans on operating an adult day care center at Moiliili Hongwanji once the renovations are completed but feels it is still premature to work on a lease agreement now. Six months prior to the completion of the renovations is when Glenn would like to discuss an agreement, including lease rent, and begin to actively recruit clients and staff.

Project Dana: Standing on the Shoulders of Giants

Excerpts from Martha Samson's Talk

"Project Dana has truly been built by visionary leaders who come together with the sole purpose of making life better for the frail, elderly, and disabled in our community. They created this unique project with the means and infrastructure that have allowed thousands to experience the life changing, community changing, world changing concept of DANA.

Among these early supporters was my dear friend *former* Bishop Rev. Yoshiaki Fujitani. He was always so supportive and continued to attend Advisory Council Meetings until well into his 90's. When Rev. Fujitani was Bishop, he was a major force to encourage interfaith events and cooperation between different faiths communities in Hawaii. He led the effort to organize the annual Interfaith Thanksgiving eve services that is still being observed today among the temples and churches in Hawaii... I would encourage you to make it a point to attend the service this year.

When Shimeji Kanazawa needed a meaningful name for her new project she called on her friend, Mrs. Ruth Tabrah. Ruth was an ordained Minister at the Honpa Hongwanji Hawaii Betsuin and was an authority on the history of Buddhism in Hawaii... Ruth chose the ancient Sanskrit word "DANA" meaning selfless giving with no expectation of reward or recognition, for the name and guiding principal for this new project, with the Lotus as its logo. She wrote" In the Buddhist tradition in particular the lotus growing out of the mud to rise to the pure beauty of its flowering symbolizes the spiritual journey of each of us. Like the lotus, we too rise from the darkness of ignorance and self -centeredness to the pure beauty, light, and warmth of compassion selflessly extended to others.

I had to include Dr. Mary Bitterman. She has been with Project Dana from the very beginning, helping us write grants, serving as a trusted advisor to Shim and Rose in those early days, serving on the Advisory Council, and to this day, she is always giving us her wise advice and counsel and we literally cannot make a decision without her. On any issue, the Advisory Council as a whole says, "Let's call Mary and see what she thinks". She is always a phone call away and a dear friend to Project Dana.

Project Dana helps provide support that is so needed to combat the issues of loneliness and isolation along with the mental and physical challenges associated with aging. The pandemic has changed the world as well and we are much more aware of the need to keep our elders healthy and not expose them to diseases or contagions. Many of our volunteers are aging as well and we need to find ways to support our elderly population."
